Blue marlin have continued into December and January with good numbers being recorded when the effort has been put into them. Most fish are between 80kg and 140kg and a few 200's thrown in for good measure. Up to 4 to 6 bites a day are still being recorded and a few days boats have released 4 fish. Lure fishing has been the most productive but the small fish have been pesky and hard to hook on the larger lures being towed. Live baiting with the skipjack and small yellowfin has been dynamite but the sharks are a little problematic on the FADS. The shortbill spearfish should be turning up as well as black marlin.

Fish Vava'u with friends

As a charter boat operator I find that most captains and crew are restricted to fishing a few different seasons and have large slots in between, and making enough to continue is starting to become a big issue with a lot of professional crew. What we are doing is putting our boats up for lease to other captains as well as some private anglers so they can organize their own charters and be able to come over for a week, month or longer and fish their own clients the way they want. This takes away the problem of

not having enough work to justify leasing a vessel and also allows anglers the opportunity to fish new grounds with the crew they know and enjoy fishing with. The season starts in May and carries on until mid January. For more information email Greg (Muddy) Edwards on captainmud@bigpond.com

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Reel Addiction totals 87 billfish

When you spend more than half your time fishing for other species like wahoo, yellowfin, dogtooth and mahi mahi to still produce 87 billfish shows how good the fishing really is. Reports from other fishing boats also show it to be a good season. It is only a few more months before it all starts again and this year is already shaping up to be a good one.



Big Yellowfin Tuna no show yet

This time of year usually produces great yellowfin tuna fishing with fish over 70kg regular shows at the dock. A few 30 to 40kg fish are being caught with the biggest at 58kg on Kiwi Magic. There are plenty of schooling fish to 10kg around and the FADs and in most areas are loaded with mahi-mahi. For the year the heaviest blue (legal) was 325kg, the biggest being Jeff Le Strange from Hakula Lodge 447kg blue on 60kg. Heaviest yellowfin tuna 94.3kg, sailfish 46kg even though larger ones were released. Over the following months and until the start of the tourist season in May only the occasional day is spent out fishing for marlin with most local anglers fishing for the yellowfin and mahi mahi. While the island has been hurt from the cyclone the Tongans will always be ready to welcome any tourist to their islands.
